## AAOMP teams with Ad Council on kids' oral health

AAOMP is joining an oral health literacy campaign aimed at improving children's oral health. The 3-year effort will feature messages in the national media.

"Millions of minority and underserved children's caregivers must be informed, by an effective multimedia message, about the importance of having their children avoid oral disease by establishing proper preventive behaviors," says AAOMP President Michael Kahn. "We will join 19 other dental interest groups in the Partnership for Healthy Mouths, Healthy Lives to share the importance of good oral health for good overall health in kids."

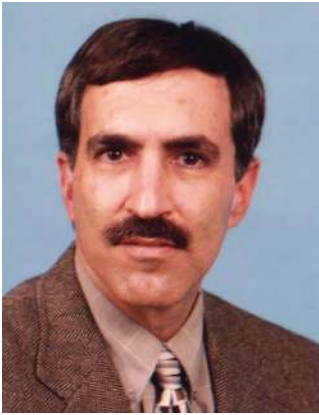
The program is led by the Ad Council, which created iconic campaigns such as United Negro College Fund's "A Mind is a Terrible Thing to Waste" and McGruff the Crime Dog's "Take A Bite Out Of Crime".

The campaign is slated to begin appearing in national media and on a customized website in 2012. The AAOMP has pledged \$1000 to the campaign for each of the next 3 years.

# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear AAOMP Members and Fellows,

I'd like to thank Janet and Karen, the Executive Council, and the Education and Local Arrangement Committees for doing such an outstanding job in developing and running our recent annual Academy meeting in San Juan, Puerto Rico. The quality of the posters and oral abstract essays were excellent and the continuing education programs contained many practice-oriented tips and facts. Based on attendees' feedback and comments made to me, the annual meeting achieved our twin goals of being both educational and a chance to reacquaint with colleagues and establish new friendships. This newsletter has information about upgrades and updates to our web site, our new electronic Mail List and upcoming educational events such as ESTOP, WESTOP, Gorlin Conference and 'save a date' information for the next annual meeting. Also included are lists of our new Members, Fellows, Emeritus Fellows and award winners at the annual meeting.

I am most grateful and honored to serve as your President this coming year and will make every effort possible to ensure that your professional interests are at the forefront and the Academy is recognized each and every time it is appropriate, both within organized dentistry and medicine. Following the annual meeting, I used the willingness to serve form to assign new members to our standing committees, ad hoc committees and gave each Chair their charges (Note - the committee members and their charges are listed on our web site).

Several important issues that Council and our committees are working on include PECOS (medicare reimbursement registration), interstate diagnosis of biopsy specimens (see box below), the American Society of Dentist Anesthesiologist's application for ADA specialty recognition, the Head and Neck Pathology journal's affiliation with AAOMP (Triple O remains the sole official publication of the Academy), and giving our support to several important legislative bills awaiting congressional action. Additionally, both the Professional and Public Relations committee and an ad hoc group of Paul Freedman, Jeff Stewart, and Lynn Solomon are revising our "Insist on the Services of an Oral Pathologist" brochure. Most recently, the AAOMP as well as the ADA and 18 other dental organizations signed for a 3 year commitment to work with the Partnership for Healthy Mouths, Healthy Lives dental coalition. Led by the Dental Trade Alliance Foundation, the famous Ad Council will develop a national media campaign to stress ways parents and caregivers can instill oral hygiene behavior that will result in a lifetime of good oral health.

Lastly, you might recall that for the past several years we have attempted to schedule a joint meeting with other organizations, initially with the AAOMR and, more recently, with the AAOM. The AAOM has been very receptive to our initial inquiry and I will be meeting in November with their board of directors to conduct further discussions about a joint annual meeting in 2015. I will keep you abreast about this educational endeavor that no doubt would result in valuable networking and a tremendous amount of continuing education courses for the betterment of our patient's oral health.

I hope you are able to enjoy the remainder of the summer with some well earned personal time.

## **Interstate Biopsy Diagnosis Issue**

Following the AAOMP meeting, Drs. Kahn, Kalmar, Melrose, Vincent, and Freedman spoke to a legal counsel and asked them to do research and give an opinion on how the recent Idaho and Washington state medical pathology diagnosis lawsuit might affect the interstate practice of oral pathology biopsy services. The legal advice rendered at this time, with many questions remaining, suggest that lab directors consult with their legal counsel regarding the licensure requirements in the states from which they accept tissue specimens for examination and the risk associated with interstate review of tissue specimens. As more details emerge the Academy's new Mail List will be utilized to keep you abreast of the issue.

The Fifth Annual Gorlin Conference will be Friday, October 14 through Sunday, October 16 in Minneapolis MN. We will welcome any oral path resident who has not already attended for 3 years. ## Government-Run Health Insurance: How Medicare Works For Us

Those of us who are Medicare providers are well aware of the Medicare allowance on our usual fees, generally in the range of 30 cents on the dollar. Well, here is a new one that happened to me. I was telling my story to Bruce Barker and he suggested I tell it to the Academy.

A Medicare beneficiary consulted an oral surgeon in Indiana because of increasing swelling of his tongue, making breathing, eating, and talking difficult. Indeed, the tongue was enlarged. The oral surgeon did two biopsies, one on each side of the tongue. The specimens were sent to our lab in Indianapolis and we received them one day later. After overnight processing, I viewed both slides the next morning and observed that the tongue was diffusely infiltrated by an eosinophilic material; I suspected amyloid. I ordered Crystal Violet and Congo Red stains, both of which showed the anticipated metachromasia and “apple green” birefringence respectively. It was now three days after the biopsy was performed. I called the oral surgeon to apprise him of the situation and was informed that on the evening of the biopsy the man experienced severe dyspnea and was rushed to the emergency room of a Lafayette hospital. Unfortunately the man died that evening. The oral surgeon informed me that this was now

a coroner’s case and that an autopsy was being performed by a forensic pathologist. I was asked to call him and tell him what I found.

I called the pathologist and informed him of my findings. I suggested that the man may have primary disease or perhaps myeloma-associated amyloidosis. The pathologist had already performed the autopsy but told me he did not remove the tongue. The body was already at the mortuary but he said he would go there and remove the tongue and try to get some bone marrow. He thanked me for the information. I issued a report on that day.

Medicare was billed \$310 and we received \$96 and some change. About a month later, I received a letter from Medicare demanding that I refund the money because my service was provided after the death of the beneficiary. Furthermore, I was informed that I was “not without fault” for filing this claim. (That statement really p---ed me off.). I filed an appeal, providing the scenario as you have just read plus the fact that the man actually died of systemic amyloidosis. My appeal was denied, the reason being that the 88305.26 and 88313.26 CPT codes cannot be provided and billed after the death of a beneficiary. Basically Medicare just reiterated what they told me initially.

I have written both of my Senators and my Congressman about this situation and plan to file a second appeal to a “higher” authority. In the meantime, should we call the doctor who did the biopsy or the patients themselves to make certain they have not yet met their demise before submitting out claims to Medicare?

# IN MEMORIAM

**JOHN "JAY" M. FOLEY, CAPTAIN, USN (RET)** • passed away on April 16, 2011, at the age of 77 in Leesburg, FL. Dr. Foley was born in Baltimore, MD on November 16, 1933, where he attended Loyola College and received a B.S. in 1955. He was awarded his D.D.S. from the University of Maryland in 1959.

Dr. Foley initiated his career on the faculty of the University of Maryland and as a fellow at the National Institute of Health. In 1966 he was called to duty in the Navy Dental Corps and stationed in Danang, Vietnam where he was awarded four campaign stars. The Navy would become his passion for the next 34 years, serving with dedication and distinction. He completed a five-year residency in 1973 including a M.S. from the University of Indiana. During his Naval career; he established the Oral Pathology Laboratory at Balboa Naval Hospital, San Diego, CA, served as Chairman of Oral Pathology at NNDC, Bethesda, MD, Commanding Officer, NDC, Pearl Harbor, HI, Force Dental Officer, COMSUBPAC, eventually retiring as Fleet Dental Officer. CINCPACFLT and awarded the Legion of Merit for a life long career of distinguished service.

Captain Foley was married to Laurie Skanes who preceded him in death on May 12, 2002. Captain Foley's enduring support of the military oral pathology community was most appreciated and his professorial guidance will be missed.
